From our Members....

Creative Tip: Markers on Fabric

More and more options are available to us for marking pens that work well on fabric. Beyond labels, adding details to both traditional and art quilts can be great fun with the right marking pens. Not all markers are created equal! It is very important NOT to use some permanent markers, such as the classic Sharpies, because they not only bleed badly on fabric, they contain harsh chemicals that can halo out a yellowish-green stain over time, and damage fibers. Many quilt shops carry some of my favorite brands of textile markers: Fabrico (made by Tsukineko), Micron, and SetaScrib for fabric. However, there are many excellent markers besides these that work wonderfully on fabric, are permanent and washable, which we may find in art and craft supply stores. For labels, I prefer the roller ball Sakura Gelly Roll pens - they are lovely to use, as they smoothly glide without catching in the fibers, as the fine tip Microns tend to do. I also love the PITT Artist Pens by Faber-Castell, available in a wide array of colors at your art supply shops. A new addition to my array of markers for fabrics are the Tombow ABT markers. Look for acid free, waterproof and permanent. They will be the most likely NOT to bleed badly on your fabrics, nor damage them in the long run. These are just a few of the many marker options available to us. Go ahead and experiment and have some fun with these!

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I mentioned at the last guild meeting that Jean O'Neil was looking for help from the guild for a shelter she is involved with. Here is more information on that project

From [Jean O'Neil](#)...

My friend who is an RN (we worked together for many years at the Brigham) runs a shelter on Martha's Vineyard called the "Vineyard House". It is a home for homeless men and women, who during the summer months work at hotels etc and live in the campground. Once winter sets in, the hotels close they move to back the campgrounds.

I am so inspired by her dedication to this and I wanted to help. I am trying to make 25 quilts, size 4x6 aprox. with flannel backing and machine quilted. I just finished one and have another cut out...so 23 would be the more accurate number.

If you could put this in the newsletter, great, I would appreciate it. She has already received funding and with community help has built a place called Vineyard House. It is so amazing what one person can do.

I would like the quilts to have flannel backs and aprox. 4x6 and machine quilted. If only tops are available, I can do machine quilting.

This exhibit consists of works that represent unique approaches and interpretations of the theme and help illustrate the diversity of styles, techniques, and materials being used by the Studio Art Quilt Associates members.

“AFFAIRS OF THE HEART” GO RED FOR WOMEN JURIED QUILT SHOW

Use your creativity to express how heart disease has affected you, your family, or your friends.

Entry deadline: Postmarked by Oct. 15, 2016 **Acceptance notification:** Dec. 31, 2016 **Exhibition/Luncheon:** Feb. 28, 2017

Rules & how to enter:

Quilts must have been completed within the last two years, be made of fabric, and contain three layers. They will be judged on appearance, design, workmanship and theme.

Each quilt must be a minimum of 24 inches in each dimension and not exceed 160 inches for all four sides. All works must be ready for installation with a minimum 4 inch sleeve across the top back of the quilt and a label with the quilt maker's name and address in a bottom corner of the back of the quilt. The American Heart Association reserves the right to disqualify any work.

Shipping and insurance costs are the quilt maker's responsibility. The American Heart Association will pay for return shipment and insurance.

Quilt makers whose works are chosen will be invited to attend the 2017 Go Red For Women Luncheon as guests of the AHA Waltham Office. Limit of two entries per quilt maker.

Entries must be accompanied by two 3 inch by 5 inch photographs — one detail and one full-view shot. Each photograph must be labeled with the name of the quilt maker, the title and completion date of the work, and the quilt's dimensions in inches.

Our Raffle quilt top is completed and is quite lovely. We will have it at the Jan meeting for all to see. In the past we have had longarmers quilt our raffle quilts with no charge. We have decided this year that we will pay for the quilting and would like to offer it first to our members before going outside of our guild. The quilt will require custom quilting. It is 88 ½ inch square. Timing is critical as we want to make the decision at the Jan 27 committee meeting and have the quilt ready for marketing by mid May. We would prefer to have one of our members do this, but obviously since we are going from a zero budget to now paying for it, pricing is can be the deciding factor. RNQG 2017 QUILT SHOW

Our next quilt show is in March 2017 and the planning is well under way. And you say *WHAAAT!!!* Yes, we have to start planning the show a year and half to 2 years ahead. I know that sounds crazy but here are a few reasons why. Venue contracts are signed very soon after the previous show. Vendors are sent “save the date” cards 1- 1 1/2 years in advance because they book their shows that far in advance. The Raffle quilt has to be completed in order to have a year to travel. That also means raffle tickets are printed and marketing bookmarks are printed and sent out to local and regional shows. So as you can see, a lot of early work goes into the show and we have several members already digging into their volunteer positions.

Our first Show Committee meeting is on January 27 at the Walpole library at 630. **All** committee members are *highly* encouraged to come as we need all your input. Several items need to be discussed and decisions to be made. I also want to encourage anyone who may not have signed up yet for a position (and there are many of you) but are willing to help in some way to please come and we can find a fit for you. Since many of our members may not have been members during our previous shows, here is a brief summery for the positions that still need to be filled.

- Volunteer Coordinator- Have signup sheets at the guild meetings prior to the show. Then assign the volunteers to the many various jobs during the 3 day work schedule
- Show set up and Take Down- this person is in charge of the racks being put up and taken down according to the floor design and hanging the quilts on the assigned racks. This person will have serveral helpers assigned but the chair person for this should probably have some experience working on this committee at past shows.
- Floor Plan Design- This person will receive the quilt measurements and then create the floor plan for the placement of the quilts. We do have a lot of past info for this position and because we are using the same site as in prior years, the vendor’s spaces on the design are already in place. This person needs to be good with math and organizing. If you have a floor plan computer program to help you that is helpful but not required.

- Quilt Central- Organizes the collection of the quilts (usually at the Guild meeting before the show), transports the quilts to the show on Friday at the time of setup. Aids the Set up committee in getting the quilts to the correct rack. At the time of take down, quilts are handed out to the quilters after the show is done. There are rules and procedures in place already as to how this all happens.
- Raffle baskets and donations- will solicit products for raffle baskets. Organize the products into baskets, wrap and label for display.
- Quilt labels- Quilt information is sent to you via an excel program, you would print the quilt labels onto Avery labels and pin to the quilts at set up.

We have information for helping with all of these positions. You do not have to figure this out from scratch! If you would consider taking on one of these positions, we would greatly appreciate it. This is YOUR guild, YOUR show.

Come to the US premier of the 12th Quilt Nihon Exhibit at the New England Quilt Museum. NEQM is the only Northeast venue to show case these award winning quilts from the international completion of the Japanese Handicraft Instructors Association (JHIA).

For more than 40 years, the JHIA has been promoting handcrafted arts in Japan by educating and training instructors in a variety of specialties. Their biennial Quilt Nihon Exhibition is the largest international quilting contest in Japan and one of the most prestigious in the world.

The 12th competition drew 341 quilt entries from 12 countries. Seventy nine quilts in both traditional and contemporary categories were selected for display at the Tokyo Metropolitan Art Museum in April 2014. This traveling exhibition will feature 32 of these stunning quilts, beautifully displayed in the galleries of the New England Quilt Museum, January 6, through May 1, 2016.

Lecture: "Quilting That Saw Us Through the War Years"**



From 1941-1945, most able-bodied women expended all of their energies employed in the defense industry, volunteering for the Red Cross, planting Victory Gardens, and keeping the “home fires burning.” These were essential activities of women on the home front. During this stressful time, women were also making thousands of quilts. Sue will share with us her collection of World War II quilts and explain their significance within the historical context.

Sue has extensive experience in quilt making. Through access to newspapers and magazines of the World War II era, she has also been able to authenticate the patterns and designs available to quiltmakers, anchoring the quilts historically in time. She is a certified AQS appraiser and an NQA trained quilt judge. She lectures nationally on a variety of quilt history topics. She has authored *Quilts and Quiltmakers Covering Connecticut*; *Quilting, Frolics & Bees: 100 years of Signature Quilts*; *Quilting News of Yesteryear: 1,000 Pieces and Counting*; *Quilting News of Yesteryear: Crazy as a Bed Quilt*; *World War II Quilts*, and her most recently released book, *World War I Quilts*.

Topic: Fussy-Cutting Trunk Show

Fussy-cutting consists of isolating a particular motif in a fabric design and cutting it exactly alike several times so when the pieces are sewn back together, a kaleidoscopic or mirror-image effect is created. In this lecture, Ann demonstrates how to choose an appropriate border print for fussy-cutting, how to prepare templates, and how to fussy-cut and pin the pieces for sewing. These can be used in creating wall hangings, matted blocks, cards, purses, and Christmas ornaments.



Ann describes herself as a contemporary traditionalist when it comes to quilting. Much of her work is based on traditional quilt blocks such as Card Trick, Mariner's Compass, and Eight-Pointed Star. Modern cottons, hand-dyed fabrics, border prints, and fussy-cutting give her work a contemporary feel.

A quilter since 1978, Ann began her teaching career in 1987. While living in Boston, she was a member of the Proper Bostonian Quilters. Now a resident of Plymouth, MA she is a member of the Bayberry Quilters of Cape Cod; the East Coast Quilters Alliance; and the American Quilter's Society. Her quilted creations have won ribbons at the Vermont Quilt Festival and *A Quilter's Gathering*. They have also been juried into the New England Images and East Coast Quilters Alliance shows.


