NOVEMBER 14, 2012 GUILD MEETING

Linda Warren Lecture: "How Did You Come Up With That?"

Linda is frequently asked this question about her patterns! This trunk show and lecture describes how she develops an idea and how her ideas ultimately become patterns. You will see a myriad of samples of her amazing work.

A quilter since 1999, Linda has taught quilting for seven years. In addition to lectures and trunk shows, she publishes her own line of quilt patterns and is the inventor of *The Learning Curve* ruler.



NOVEMBER 17, 2012 THURSDAY WORKSHOP

Linda Warren "Over the Moon"

This stunning illusion is achieved with just one curved unit alternating with squares. The curved units create perfect circles in this machine-pieced quilt. Requires use of The Learning Curve ruler and Free Form Curved Piecing. Anyone can learn how!





JANUARY 16, 2013 GUILD MEETING

Diana Annis Workshop "1600 quilt"

Question: What is 1,600 inches long when it starts and finishes to 48" x 64"?

Answer: The Jelly Roll 1,600 Quilt!

This popular quilt pattern is a breeze to put together in a day! The guild's own Diana Annis will teach you the fun-fast-and-furious technique.

If you participated in the fabric strip swap option from the Summer Challenge, you likely have everything you need. Didn't do the fabric swap? No problem -- just bring forty (40) 2-1/2" X 42" fabric strips (and the rest of the workshop supply list) to the meeting!



FEBRUARY 20, 2013 GUILD MEETING

Diana Annis Workshop "Finishing School"

With the RNQG Quilt Show only a month away, it is likely that several (many?) guild members have some finishing touches to put on their show pieces. During this handson guild meeting, you will learn how to

- · cut a quilt binding strip,
- attach a binding with perfectly mitered corners,
- make your binding ends join perfectly,
- cut and attach a hanging sleeve and
- design a label for your quilt.



Each topic will be described and demonstrated. Participants will then be given the opportunity to work on their own quilts for a short period of time before instruction for the next topic begins.

Each participant will receive a reference sheet to bring home so they can complete their projects with confidence.

Diana is a familiar face at RNQG meetings, having held several board positions over the years.

She is a professional machine quilter who "loves [her] job." An experienced teacher of piecing and quilting techniques, Diana started a longarm quilting business in 2007. Customer quilts have appeared in national magazines and many have received prizes. Though she has little time left to complete her own projects, she has received awards for some of her creations.

Always modest, she is "currently working on improving my skills."

MAY 15, 2013 GUILD MEETING

Ami Simms

Lecture: "Living With Quilts: A Survival Guide"



This tongue-in-cheek presentation teaches creative coping strategies for quilters. Topics include how to:

- pad your house (quilt display and storage);
- appropriate more studio space (why stop with the spare bedroom;
- eliminate pesky distractions (cooking and cleaning);
- increase storage capacity (batting goes in the oven);
- the best way to deal with the guilt of UFOs (ignore it)!

Ami is the author of eight books on quilting, creator of *The WORST Quilt in the World Contest®* and founder/executive director of the Alzheimer's Art Quilt Initiative. She has lecturing and leading workshops on quilting across the United States and internationally since 1982. In 2005, *Professional Quilter Magazine* selected her as Quilter of the Year.

She has made more than 200 quilts of varying sizes, in traditional and contemporary designs, both hand and machine quilted. Her quilts have been featured in several national magazines and a few books. They have also been exhibited in juried competitions across the US.

MAY 16, 2012 THURSDAY WORKSHOP

Ami Simms

"Twisted Sisters"

In this pattern, light and dark fabrics are stitched or "sistered" together, sliced, and recombined to make twisting pinwheel-type blocks that fit together with or without sashing strips. Other options include floating the pinwheels, folding 3-dimensional block centers, and experimenting with leftover chunks, bits, and pieces to create more quilts. You'll have a lot of choices. Ami is shown above wearing a sample of the pattern.

Quilt Show Entry Opportunity

National Scenic Byway Foundation Endorses "Beauty of America's Byways" Showcase in NY -- Quilter Participation Invited from Patchwork Parkway to Great Lakes Seaway Trail, Paul Bunyan Byway and Beyond

Great Lakes Seaway Trail, NY/PA; Denver, CO; Peoria, IL – The National Scenic Byway Foundation, Denver, CO, has endorsed the "Beauty of the Byways" theme for the 2013 Great Lakes Seaway Trail Quilt Show in Sackets Harbor, NY.

There are 150 federally-designated byways in the U.S. Quilting as an American cultural heritage tradition is a popular theme for travelers on the Great Lakes Seaway Trail National Scenic

Byway -- the 518-mile leisure driving and boating route along the St. Lawrence River and Great Lakes in New York and Pennsylvania.

Show organizers are inviting American and Canadian fabric artists and quilters to enter quilted works of any size showcasing a favorite byway or backroad, its landscape or waterfront, or scenic, natural, historic, cultural and recreational treasures with short personal essays or stories to be displayed with each work extolling the factual virtues of the chosen byway, one's own travel adventure on the byway, or how the quilt's design blends into fictional tales of waterfront romance, fun in the sun or byway meanderings.

"This Great Lakes Seaway Trail quilting event creates a unique way to increase awareness of the diversity of the byway experiences available across America and to inspire travel which, in turn, creates positive economic impact in byway communities," says National Scenic Byway Foundation President Anaise Berry, director of the Illinois River Road National Scenic Byway, Peoria, IL.

The show's relaxed guidelines invite participation by all ages and skill levels to create a quilted work of any size – from miniatures and wallhangings to bed quilts, even quilted apparel -- for the "Beauty of the Byways" themed March 16-17 and March 23-24, 2013 show in Sackets Harbor, NY.

Works may be pieced, appliquéd, traditional, pictorial, contemporary, embellished, an art quilt, or wearable art.

Viewer's Choice and special recognition will be presented to the "Best of the Beauties" from among entries for individual states and provinces.
