Abby and her team not only created a beautiful raffle quilt, but they have tried different venues and techniques as they help our guild raise money by selling the raffle tickets. We all have received 4 books to sell. Please consider selling at least the 4 books you have received. Diana and Jane, along with all of their committee chairs, have been HARD at work on the Quilt Show. It takes a lot of time to put together and they have been busy lining up vendors, donations, and coming up with creative new ideas for attracting new members. We still need someone to volunteer for Set-up and Take-down of the show. The Quilt Show is our opportunity to show off all of the beautiful work that each of us has created over the last two years and it can't be done without everyone pitching in and volunteering. Please consider stepping forward and helping out with these two important volunteer positions for the show. Thanks.

Lisa presented a fabulous Power Point presentation of all of the programs that she has put into place for us at our September meeting. During her presentation she showed us an actual sample of the quilt that Cynthia England was going to teach. By the end of the meeting the workshop was full and had a waiting list. In October Cynthia came and I think that everyone who attended will agree that she was a wonderful teacher who also put a lot of humor into her talk. The workshop she taught the next day was great. Those who were taking it for a second time (she taught a class 10 years ago to our membership) were able to learn from her experience of using her technique and to learn her shortcuts, which were really useful. The night Cynthia spoke to the guild she mentioned that she had been informed that she had won an award at the Houston Quilt Show but was not informed which one. We now know that she won Best of Show. Thank you Lisa for bringing us one of the top quilters in the country!!

This month we are having Pat Harrison come and illustrate to us how having a Judged Quilt Show is useful to all quilters. The first quilt show that I ever entered at RNQG was in 2013 and Pat was the judge. I volunteered to help during the day that she judged the quilts which people had submitted and learned so much from what she had us record about each quilt. I was a new quilter and the comments that she shared about my quilts were instructive and I have tried to correct my mistakes based on what I learned. Having a judged show is important and I hope that our guild will consider going back to having one in the future.

Cris, who has been our Comfort Quilt Chairperson for the last few years, has made the decision to step down from being the chair. We all thank Cris for the wonderful work that she has done for the guild over these past few years. We are now looking for someone to please step forward and take over this very important position. As a guild, we pride ourselves on the different quilted comfort projects we have taken part in. RNQG first presented 5 quilts and a wall hanging to the Shannon McCormack House, a lodging facility for cancer patients and their families associated with the Dana Farber Cancer Institute in Brookline in 1993. Since that time we have taken part in many different projects and we REALLY need someone to help us continue in the path of service, which we have done for the past 23 years.

Judy Schmidt, our Publicity Chair, is going to have RNQG business cards printed up for our membership to give out to people who might be interested in joining our guild. The card will have a picture of our raffle quilt on the front and information about when and where we meet.

At the most recent Board meeting we discussed our membership policy of collecting dues by the end of the fiscal year. In the past we would charge a late fee of \$5 if a person signed up late. We have decided that we will create an incentive to sign up early, which helps both the membership chair and the treasurer, and we will remove the late fee. Thus, this year we will have the incentive of winning a free membership for the following year if you sign up by the June meeting. A raffle will be drawn at the June meeting with everyone's name who

has paid up by that meeting in the raffle basket. We hope you all decide to help us out by paying your dues early.

- No hanging sleeve is required.

Please bring your completed quilt to the next guild meeting for display. Since the challenge quilts will become the property of RNQG, each person who participates in the challenge will receive a small gift as a "Thank You" for participation. The challenge quilts will be listed as a Viewer's Choice judging category at the Quilt Show!

Topic: "You Be the Judge"

Have you ever wandered through a quilt show wondering why some quilts earn ribbons and others you admire equally do not? Do you question how in one show there can be several quilts in the same category with first place ribbons? This program by Pat Harrison will provide the answers!

As Rhode Island's first and only *Nationally Certified Master Quilt Judge*, Pat has proved herself an expert in this area. During her 45-minute lecture, she will identify the different judging formats and describe the steps a quilt judge follows as they evaluate a quilt.

Clearly a proponent of judging, Pat will explain why you should consider having your quilts judged as well as the rationale behind hiring a professional judge for your guild show.

The evening will conclude with a trunk show with ample time for questions and answers.

*** Saturday *** Workshop: Layered Monoprinting With Sheers (sign up with Lisa Steinka – there are still a few openings available)

In this innovative monoprinting class you will print on sheer organza using various mark making tools: paint, markers, oil crayons, etc. with fusible web and parchment to take the printing process to a new level. By cutting away and layering the sheer prints you can create depth and interest. It's a new technique that will add to your creative arsenal!

Quilt maker, designer and teacher, Esterita Austin created "The Well," a prize-winner in the 2001 American Museum of Folk Art's international contest, "Quilted Constructions: The Spirit of Design" Her works have been published in numerous periodicals, books, and newspapers. She has also been a featured artist on HGTV's "Simply Quilts" program with Alex Anderson.

Pam Weeks Website: pamweeksquilts.com

Topic: "A Complete History of Quilting in 60 Minutes or Less!"

Quilting is nearly as old as cloth, and during this informative program, Pam Weeks, the Binney Family Curator of the New England Quilt Museum, whizzes through its history, concentrating on examples from the eighteenth through twentieth centuries. During the "journey", she debunks a few popular quilt history myths, and touches on New England textile mills and technology history.

Attendees are invited to bring one guilt for identification. Quilts will be arranged in chronological order and used as examples during the lecture.

January 21, 2017 9:30AM – 4PM All About Quilts Michele O'Neil Kincaid Website: fiberartdesigns.com *** Saturday *** Workshop: Lady Slippers Trapunto

A proclaimed fan of linking history with modern techniques for fiber arts, this workshop taught by Michele O'Neil Kincaid focuses on trapunto, a quilting style that creates relief in a piece by putting an extra layer of padding behind selected areas of the design. In this class, students will learn to cord 'stems' and pad leaves. Her class includes original methods up to and including machine methods. After stitching is completed, color will be added to the flowers using pencils, markers, and crayons. Michele has explored a multitude of mediums -- pen and ink, oils and watercolors -- over the course of her career, but has always returned to textiles for selfexpression and fulfillment. Her pieces are very dimensional and tactile.

Topic: "From Concept to Consumer"

While wandering through a quilt shop, caressing cottons and contemplating color ways, it's unlikely that you've ever stopped to think about what it takes to create the fabric that is the fundamental element of our artwork. What is the process of designing fabric, having it printed and delivered to your local quilt shop? Probably much more that you ever considered!

A former fabric sales rep for Blank Quilting, Studio e Fabrics, Michelle Tade Banton has an insider's view of the process and is delighted to share her insights. A resident of Lunenburg, MA, she now spends her time doing what she loves: lecturing, teaching and organizing events for quilters and providing professional machine quilting services.

Topic: Kentucky Quilt Project and Quilt Show Prep

The Kentucky Quilt Project, Inc. (KQP) is a nonprofit organization founded in 1981. It was the *original* quilt documentation project, ultimately inspiring the documentation of more than 200,000 quilts in almost every state and a multitude of other countries.

In 1992, the KQP produced "Louisville Celebrates the American Quilt," which consisted of six exhibitions, four conferences, and two publications. From one of those conferences, "Toward an International Quilt Bibliography," the Quilt Index was born: an online resource of records documenting more than 50,000 quilts, the largest online database in the decorative arts!

Thirty years after its founding, The Kentucky Quilt Project has created another "first" – a nine-part documentary series titled "Why Quilts Matter: History, Art & Politics". The series takes a fresh look at quilts and spreads the word about their unique position at the center of a startlingly broad grid of topics, ranging from women's studies to the contemporary art market. This evening, we will project episode 1 of this series, "Quilts 101 -Antique and Contemporary Quilts". This episode introduces the audience to the brave new world of the American quilt, where the question, "What is a quilt?" has many different answers. During the video, there will be work ongoing in the background to prepare for the 2017 RNQG Quilt Show taking place at the end of the week.

Topic: "Strut Your Stuff!"

With the show behind us, it's time for the makers of the winning quilts to take a bow! Use this opportunity to:

- and simply celebrate the art that binds us together!

Modern quilts typically include bold colors and prints, high contrast, graphic areas of solid color, improvisational piecing, minimalism, and expansive negative space.

In this lecture, Riane Menardi discusses how to "zoom in" on part of a traditional quilt block and transform it into a modern guilt of any size. She discusses the differences between traditional and alternate gridwork, and some of the foundational elements of modern quilt design, including negative space, minimalism, modern color

Riane is a writer, designer and modern quilter from Des Moines, Iowa, as well as the communications manager for the Modern Quilt Guild.

QUILT SHOW NEWS

Next Committee meeting: Jan 25, 2016, 6:30 pm Walpole Library

We have made great progress on our show planning. Please be sure to read your newsletters as we approach the show, as there will be many changes in process. We will try to have the most detailed information in our newsletters so not as much time is spent on it at the guild meetings. But please realize, the show is our bread and butter for our guild for the next two years and it is essential that we have a chance to answer all questions. We do have members who have not been with us for past shows, as well as members who have been with us for many years, and many aspects of the show will be new or changed from what you may know. Our next show committee meeting will be Jan 25th at the Walpole Library at 6:30 PM. All show committee chairs are encouraged to attend and anyone else interested is welcome.

SPECIAL EXHIBIT: Our special exhibit from Hoffman Challenge has been chosen. We have 40 quilts and 16 home decor items coming and Mary Sandison has been busy working on the layout. We now have a very good idea on how many of our bases and drapes we will need for the special exhibit, and she will be ready to work on the member's quilt layout as the entries come in.

QUILT ENTRIES: Each member can enter as many quilts as you wish, but your first 3 are the ones we guarantee to have in the show. After that, it is based on space available. You will want to number your quilts accordingly. Quilt entries are due no later (earlier the better!) than January 18. Quilt entry forms are available on www.rnqg.org and we highly encourage you to do your entries as soon as you have your quilt information available for each of your quilts. You do NOT need to have it finished to do your entry. You will need to know the size for sure and have a photo in which the quilt is recognizable (it doesn't have to be quilted yet, or binding on!) The entry form has been revised and the sooner you can get an entry in, the better idea you will have if you are having any issues. The form does ask for you to upload a photo, which is the preferred choice, but if you cannot, there is another option listed for delivering the photo. No changes may be made to the forms after Jan 18. If you have any problems with your entries, please contact AnneMarie Freitas registrar@rnqq.org

VOLUNTEERS: Lisa Steinka will be providing the volunteer staffing sheets at each of the next meetings for everyone to start signing up for your show jobs. Everyone who enters a quilt is required to sign up for a minimum of two hours at the show, or four hours if two or more quilts are submitted for display. However, everyone in this guild benefits from the show. This is how we pay for our teachers, our workshops, our meeting places, etc. Even if you do not enter a quilt, you are benefiting from the show and I encourage every member to find time to volunteer for shifts at the show. We are also looking for extra able-bodied helpers for set up and

take down. If you have husbands, boyfriends, sons, or friends and family members that can do some lifting and climb ladders, we need the help. Please check out the sign ups at the Quilt show table at our meeting, or contact Lisa at volunteer@rnqq.org

BOUTIQUE: Boutique inventory forms are available on our website. Carolyn Anderson has run the boutique several times and has a good handle on it. She does have a specific system for keeping track of your sales and asks that you use her price tags that she provides and these are available from her or Diana Richard at each of the meetings up till show time! Please pick up some at the show table at each meeting.

MEMBERSHIP: We will be actively recruiting new members at the show and to help with this we are initiating a Big Sister Mentor Program. Each new member that joins at the show will not only get the usual 3 free meetings for the rest of the 2016-2017 year, but will be assigned a big sister and given that contact information that day. They will also receive a name tag (thank you Joanne Beaupre for making them ahead), be sent the last newsletter, and directory within the following week, and a call from the assigned big sister within a week to make contact and welcome the new member. The big sister should also make a point of inviting the new member to the April meeting, meet up with her there, and be ready to introduce the new member at the meeting. I am asking for 10-15 of our current members to sign up to be a big sister mentor, and the signup sheets will be at our show table at each guild meeting.

PUBLICITY: We have postcards available at the show table at the guild meeting and we have a flyer that can be printed attached to the newsletter. Please feel free to take some cards and distribute them, and print the flyer to hang in your local library, grocery store, work bulletin board, etc etc etc!! Please help us get the word out.

SHOW BOOKLET: If anyone wishes to buy a business card size or larger ad in our show booklet, please contact showchair@rnqg.org. This can be for any quilting or non-quilting business. Any help soliciting ads would be much appreciated. Contact Diana Richard for more information on sizes and prices.

SUMMER CHALLENGE: You can still turn in your summer challenge "Don't Touch the Quilts" project. Bring them to Anne Marie at any meeting up to the January meeting. This will be voted on at the show, and become part of RNQG property for future show.

RAFFLE QUILT: Once again we want to remind you to please help sell you raffle quilt tickets. Turn your stubs and money into Abby Sullivan. Our postcards have a beautiful picture of the quilt on it and if you show that photo to your friends, they will say Ooohhhh! And they will want it!! Also, keep in mind the guilt travels easily and can go with you to your local craft fair, work, or other places. Think out of the box, and especially out of the quilt world box and make it work! The quilt traveled to a retreat on the cape in Oct, and will be going to the Easton Holiday festival the weekend of Dec 3-4. I am looking for help manning our table for a few hours each day, so if you have time to help, it would be greatly appreciated. The booth is inside the Ames Memorial Hall probably in the craft fair area. Please contact Diana Richard if you can help.

QUILT APPRAISALS: Vivien Sayer will be appraising quilts again at our show and she says "Appraisals have been down nationwide, but robberies have gone up. Strange. Please encourage people to protect their treasured works by having them appraised. Also, if you will, emphasize that new quilts have value too". Interestingly, there have been several major quilt thefts lately, including a full trailer of a renowned vendor from the Houston Festival just this month. The appraisals that Vivien does are replacement value for insurance purposes. There is a fee of \$50 for written appraisal or \$25 for verbal. I recommend that you consider having your quilts appraised. .

RAFFLE BASKETS: We are putting together some quality raffle baskets for this year's quilt show. Please, pretty please, consider making a monetary (money jar will be at the show table at each meeting) and an item

donation to our efforts. The following is a list of all the things we are hoping to gather together for our themed baskets. If you are donating an item, please email Angela Dubuc at rafflebaskets@rnqq.org and tell her what you are planning to donate so we can avoid duplicates. This fundraiser will help us provide you with excellent speakers for the next two years. Please be generous. Thanks so much.

Manly Man Barbecue Basket - Man's apron, chef's hat or umbrella hat, barbecue gloves, cooking tools-spatula, fork, small bag of specialty wood chips, barbecue cookbook, barbecue spices, barbecue sauce.

Gardening Basket -Tools-spade, fork, small trellis for 20 x 16" planter, seed starter trays, gardening kneelers.

Celebrate the Fourth - Red wine, white wine, bottle of wine in blue bottle, 4th of July party invitations, red, white and blue candle or separate red, white and blue candles, Citronella candle, red, white and blue tablecloth or placemats, red plastic utensils, Patriotic fat quarters.



- BTW if you haven't tried sewing on one of these and especially if you haven't tried Free-motion quilting on a vintage Singer sewing machine, consider this:
 - 1 finishing a quilt (sewing together the top, batting and backing) by machine probably was one of the first things done with the invention of the sewing machine in the 1850's.
 - 2 these machines have a larger underarm space than modern machines: typically 7" across the bed from needle to pylon and a good 4 to 5 inches in height. Some modern machines barely have 4" to work with. This allows you to fit and work with larger quilts than you can deal with, with most modern machines.
 - 3 Feed Dog Drop for free motion quilting on many models. The Singer 201, and the "15" series (15-88, 15-90, and 15-91) all have simple mechanisms for dropping feed dogs via a thumb screw located just under the bed in front.
 - 4 The Heavy Weight of the machine allows you to move the quilt around without fear of the machine moving around.
 - 5 Original Singer Cabinets provide an even better stability for free motion work.
