She enjoys learning new techniques and has even stepped out of her comfort zone to try art quilting. Her goal is to challenge herself and learn something new with every quilt.

Tina's work has been exhibited at Mid-Atlantic Quilt Festival, World Quilt New England, and QuiltCon Together 2021. She was featured in Issue 25 of Quiltfolk. She currently serves as Co-Vice-President of Ninigret Quilters and is a member of Narragansett Bay Quilters Association, and The Modern Quilt Guild.



Barbara Graceffa is an award-winning quilter with more than 40 years experience who has won many laurels:

- she is a juried member of the NEQM Teachers' League;

Topic: "10 Quilters You Should Know and Why"



Did you ever wonder how we came to have all the wonderful tools and materials that we now have to use in our quilting? The lecture this evening highlights the changes in modern American quilt making over the course of the past 30 years. The presentation tells the tale of ten women who worked together following WW2 to facilitate a resurgence of interest in quilting.

Linda Pearl is a history buff who is also a blogger, teacher, and pattern designer fascinated by many aspects of the quilting world. She discovered quiltmaking as a teenager and has pursued the art since that time. She made her first quilt over 25 years ago. Her design aesthetic has evolved from traditional to what she now categorizes as contemporary-heading-to-modern.

Linda describes herself as, "An avid collector of fabrics... now drawn into finding ways to incorporate my beautiful stash into new projects, a passion which I find is shared by many quilters today. The good news is that this passion has no calories or expiration date." She loves to meet with quilters and vendors of all genres. She believes she can learn something new (often about herself) everyday. Some of her work has been featured in books and magazines, and her patterns are available for purchase from her website.

One of Linda's *favorite* things to do is talk to and meet with guilds, and she is fortunate to have frequent opportunities to do so. In 2022, she became a Certified Instructor for Sew Kind of Wonderful Quilts. This allows her to share her love of curves with other quilters.

**Topic: "Quilting with African Fabrics"** 



African fabrics are known worldwide for their bold designs, creative patterns and bright color combinations. When quilters first encounter them in stores and at shows, they may be intrigued but have *no idea* how to use the fabrics effectively in quilts.

Lisa Shepard Stewart graduated from the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York City and is a writer and designer based in New Jersey. Her obsession with African textiles began during a trip to Senegal, West Africa in 1986. She now offers classes and events internationally and regularly travels to Ghana to source artists, fabrics and materials.

Her lecture, "Quilting with African Fabrics", provides quilters of all skill levels with new ideas and creative insights for using African fabrics in quilts: from cotton prints and handcrafted batiks to pieced mudcloth and korhogo projects. A sampling of handbags and accessories, home decor and crafts are also included.

They will answer questions about bindings, blocking guilts, best pressing practices, squaring up, color theory, thread issues, machine tension, guilter's math, pattern reading, how to use all your sewing machine's functions and much more.
